Ben has over 31,187 volunteer hours setting up monthly book sales and won every volunteer award offered. Linda has over 10.729 hours at book sales and as the record keeper, secretary and treasurer of the Friends group. The Stathams continue to state the success of the Alpharetta Friends is a team effort, but this duo has contributed more attention, heart, talent and time than any other group.

Staff and volunteers describe them as consistent, dedicated and humorous leaders. They are very passionate about education and literacy, believing and showing libraries help change lives. Everything they do reflects these values. Ben has recruited and managed a book sale volunteer force, giving people in the Alpharetta area (and beyond) who love books and libraries a chance to contribute to this community and be a part of something

important. Other Friends Groups look to them for guidance and regular shoppers enthusiastically return each month because of their relationships.

Alpharetta staff shared, "Ben and Linda are very special people and we are so lucky to have worked with them. They are very dedicated to this branch, put in a lot of time and effort and love sharing their passion for books. They have huge hearts and are invaluable to both the community and to

the library. Their years managing the FOTAL book sales has made possible countless new library programs and materials."

They have distinguished themselves as servant leaders who have made an impact on this reader, our library system, our patrons, our staff and our volunteers. Thank you both and best wishes on your next retirement adventure.

LET'S SEEDINGS OF THE SEEDINGS

2024 was an instrumental year for FulcoLibrary's Social Services team. From branch referrals to client walk-ins and new community partnerships, FulcoLibrary provided support and services for over 895 patrons. Requests range from clients fleeing domestic violence, assistance with immigration services, seniors seeking assistance with Medicare enrollment, connections for senior home improvements, to helping clients get document ready, and offering assistance to the homeless population.



Throughout the year, the social services team conducted 89 "Ask the Social Worker" sessions, allowing patrons to make appointments with a social worker or walk in and seek social services from their local library branch. By providing this service, clients and families now have a familiar face at the library, providing the security of a safe place to turn for assistance with private and personal matters.

In 2024, FulcoLibrary's Social Services team also launched "Helping Mamas" at the Hapeville Library, where families can pick up diapers and period products, with plans to launch in more branches in 2025. Look out for more positive impacts from this program in the coming year. No one should ever have to decide between purchasing diapers or purchasing food, and now there is a service to help fill that gap for families in need.



elebrating the 30th anniversary of the Auburn Avenue Research

Library (AARL), the Fulton County Library System and the Atlanta-Fulton Public Library Foundation commissioned a special edition library card, honoring the library's history and African American culture in Atlanta. Designed by acclaimed artist Charly Palmer, the card pays tribute to Annie McPheeters, a trailblazer for libraries in Black communities.

Palmer, a visual artist with over 40 years of experience, describes himself: "I'm a dreamer." Having attended AARL's grand opening and showcased his work there, Palmer was thrilled to join this project.

"I immediately asked for references—photographs of Annie McPheeters, old images of the library, anything that could inspire me."

His research informed a collage intertwining historical elements with Atlanta landmarks. Starting with quick sketches or "thumbnails," Palmer refined concepts to capture his vision.

After initial approval of a design featuring 1920s women, he discovered a photo of Black children holding state signs. Inspired, he reimagined it with words like "courage," "strength," and "intelligence."

"When there's a printed item, whether it's a card or a book. I live forever," Palmer says. "I'm now a part of this library, a part of its history." The original artwork will be permanently displayed at AARL.

A signed library card is available now at the Auburn Avenue Research Library on a first-come, first-served basis.


